



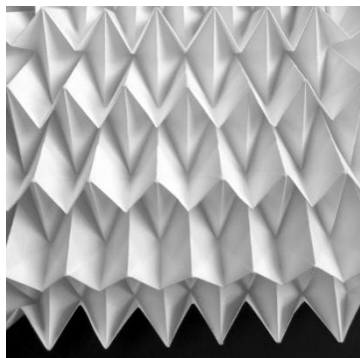

Folding Structures – Paper Lampshades

Many folded structures in architecture and design are inspired by traditional paperfolding arts. Following a brief introduction to the topic, we will practise various folding techniques and discuss design possibilities. Even simple folded elements can be creatively combined in very different ways to form lampshades. These variations are explored either individually or in small groups and lead to personalised results, given the same initial situation.

Duration: 2–3 hours

Printing and Collage – A Creative Exercise

Simple but deliberately chosen methods encourage individual creative innovation. In this workshop, various printing techniques will be demonstrated, inviting participants to experiment with structures, shapes, and patterns. In the second part of the workshop, the printed paper serves as a starting point for large-format collages and the resulting individual works.

The material and the structure of the workshop are explicitly designed to encourage and reflect on creative processes within the group.

Weil Chair – A Chair for Everyone

Affordable design for all – this idea is as old as design itself and still just as relevant. The Berlin designer and architect Van Bo Le-Mentzel transports the concept into the digital age: construction plans for many of his designs can be downloaded from the Internet and built as a DIY project. For this workshop, Le-Mentzel has designed a new chair – the Weil Chair – which participants can build under supervision.

Build Your Own Chair – Enzo Mari

In 1974, Italian designer Enzo Mari created a guide for a pioneering furniture collection with his manual »Autoprogettazione«. This furniture could be assembled by anyone using simple materials. With expert guidance, you will build your own Sedia Uno. This workshop is not only a tribute to one of the great masters of design, but also offers the opportunity to discover and expand your own craftsmanship skills.

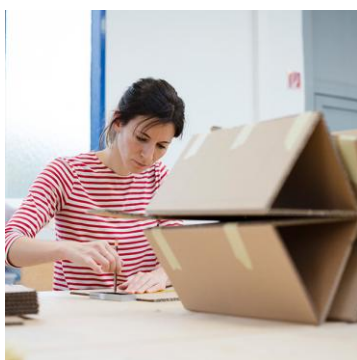
ReDesign – Light and Lamps

Light is all around us, fascinating artists since the dawn of time. Designers such as the Brazilian duo Fernando and Humberto Campana create impressive light sculptures and lamps by creatively transforming everyday objects and recycled materials. After considering the phenomenon of light, participants will use various recycled materials – such as plastic bottles, scraps of fabric and leather, electronic parts, strips of wood, and packaging – to design and create their very own light objects.

Duration: 4–6 hours

Price: € 80.00 per person (minimum fee per group € 500.00)

Group size: max. 15 people



PappDesign – Cardboard Furniture

The architect Frank Gehry created sculptural seating pieces that showcase the benefits of corrugated cardboard: it is inexpensive, light, yet also stable, and easy to work with. It's also a winner on the environmental front. Workshop participants will get to grips with the material and study its properties in depth, before designing and constructing their own seats, shelves or tables.

Duration: 4–6 hours
